Parchment.com makes it easy to search colleges, see your chances of getting in, and request, store and send transcripts when you are ready to apply.




Easily send transcripts from the comfort of your own home.


- 1) Go to www.parchment.com/join
- 2) Sign up to create your account with Parchment
- 3) Add your school to your Parchment account
 - Click the Get Started button
 - Add your high school
 - Complete waiver information
 - Complete the Transcript Authorization
 Form by either entering the Parchment
 Registration Code or electronically signing the form
 - Receive confirmation that your school has been added and begin placing transcript requests by selecting the 'Deliver' tab


4) Request delivery of your transcript to any destination worldwide


- Select the destinations, such as Academic Destinations, the NCAA, The Common Application, yourself or any other destination
- Review destinations
- Provide debit/credit card payment if there are fees associated with the request
- Receive a confirmation with the Tracking ID and next steps for your transcript request











See how you stack up.

- Complete your profile and add colleges to your list to get your data-driven Parchment predictions.
- How are these predictions created?
 Parchment builds statistical models from the results of students who have voluntarily added their admissions data in the past.
- On each college's page, click the
 "Scatterplots & Analytics" link to see a how
 you stack up against admitted and denied
 students at that college. Tip: Mouse over
 the dots to see actual student profiles.
- See each school's prediction accuracy by visiting the Chance Details page. In general, colleges with more data have better models.
- Predictions are probabilities. If you are given a 10% chance and you applied to a college 100 times, you should be accepted 10 of those times, if the college's model were accurate.



If you want to attend a college, you should ALWAYS apply. Students get in to colleges despite 0% chances. The predictions are only meant to be a guide to help you build your list.

The only way to guarantee you will not get into a college is to not apply.
